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EFTER EXAMEN

Vad gör en **BEREDSKAPSHANDLÄGGARE**

Your first job after graduation might feel like years away, and indeed it is, considering you still have two or three years left! But when the exam anxiety sets in on a Wednesday evening, all the diplomat lifestyle videos have been watched, and even the growing CSN debt isn't scaring you enough to independently "demonstrate detailed knowledge and in-depth understanding of international operational law relevant to hybrid warfare and terrorism, and how the specific nature of these phenomena influences legal interpretation and application." It requires an acute injection of study motivation!

Tim Röde obtained his Bachelor's degree in Political Science with a focus on Crisis Management and Security just over three months ago, yet he has already found a job and moved back to his hometown. Rivstart meets the newly appointed Preparedness Coordinator over Zoom on a late August evening, with the aim of discussing study motivation! Why did you choose to study at SEDU?

I already knew from high school that I wanted to study at SEDU, but what attracted me was the ability to choose a specialization for 2 out of 6 terms. You get to study political science with a menu of options. It's a very comprehensive education, highly regarded. Extremely interesting. Plus, I had a childhood dream of being a military officer, and defense and security issues have always intrigued me.

Initially, I applied for the officer program, but while browsing the website, I saw that there were other programs at SEDU that seemed very appealing.

Why not the officers' programme?

What attracted me to political science was the diversity of perspectives, you get insights into all arenas. From the local to the international, where the focus isn't just on warfare, but also on the political dimension, law, and history.

I aimed to end up in an investigative and analytical desk job, which the officers' programme doesn't lead to. You have to wait quite a few years before getting a similar opportunity through that route, while political science gives you the entry pass immediately after graduation. I knew that the Officer Program leads to a military position and you work as an ensign for two years, but I felt that I wanted more flexibility in what I could do after my education and in my future life.

I had already experienced the military during my conscription and knew what the "green" side was like; I wanted to see where a political science education could take me. However, I'm still engaged in the Home Guard and get a good dose of military activity when I miss it!

Can you tell us about when you moved to Stockholm?

It was a big adjustment. From knowing where the central station was in Gävle to having the subway, commuter train, regional trains, and Roslagsbanan all buzzing outside my window in Stockholm, it turned out to be a bit larger than I was used to; not just in terms of the number of trains! It took some time to get used to the city, and after two years, I felt almost at home. I could find my way around while walking, but everything still felt quite unpersonal. I gained an experience, and it was a fun step in my personal development to spread my wings in a new city, away from family.

Why did you move back to Gävle? Were there other jobs you looked at?

There are security-related jobs all over the country, and the cost of living outside Stockholm is appealing. That being said, there are, of course, plenty of exciting jobs in Stockholm. I also missed what Gävle had to offer, the proximity to nature and work, and the personal touch that Stockholm lacked.

You have to be careful not to fall into the trap of thinking that all jobs are in Stockholm. There are 290 municipalities, several agencies, and a vibrant business sector that is in need of the competence that SEDU graduates possess!

I also started looking for jobs quite early, initially during the Christmas before graduation. There were quite a few interesting jobs, ranging from personnel security to intelligence analysis. I happened upon an advertisement for a job that seemed perfect, even located in my hometown, so I seized the opportunity!

What do you do at work?

I function both as an internal consultant within Gävle municipality and also have the main responsibility for continuity planning for one of our four sectors – the Governance and Support sector (Municipal Executive Office). I am responsible, among other things, for coordinating volunteers for our crisis and wartime planning, continuity planning, and staff and crisis management exercises. Just this week, I finished the municipalitywide oil spill plan, which guides how we handle oil spills at sea.

What's the most enjoyable aspect of your job? Do you feel you have influence? Does it feel valuable?

The most enjoyable aspect is definitely the opportunity to steer and manage complex issues on my own. It's extremely liberating, and of course, a lot of responsibility comes with it, which suits me perfectly! I feel I have been given a lot of trust. If I need to thoroughly familiarize myself with something, I have the time for it. We deal with very difficult, important, and complex questions that require the time they need, unless an extraordinary event occurs – then it's about acting in the moment!

My strongest job-related advice is to seize the opportunities you're given to gain your own experience in security and preparedness work during your studies. It's quite different from writing an essay or taking an exam. Look for contexts where you can operationalize your theoretical knowledge; it complements your education perfectly!

Best trick during your time as a student? If you go to Coffice in the morning, you can buy lunch boxes at half price!

Get involved in the student union and attend the events organized by them. You'll get to know people from different programs and years, building an incredibly valuable network!

Prioritize conversing and discussing the study content with your classmates; collaborating helps a lot to gain new perspectives and ideas. Political science isn't just about reading; it's about understanding!

Start by reading the summaries and the parts in Swedish, then build on that with the main text and the English parts. Don't get reading glasses too late; you'll end up with a headache for three years.

There's a sauna in the changing room, remember that.

Never leave your ketchup bottle unmarked in the fridge!

Saving on food:

The vice president of the civilian section gives her best advice

When rent, course materials, and SL-passes have been paid for, there suddenly isn't much of your student loan (CSN) left to actually survive during your time as a student. To manage on a minimal budget, it's important to carefully consider your expenses and spend some time minimizing your spending.

One area that tends to drain your money is your food budget. Food can be quite expensive, especially if you're living far from major grocery stores and don't have access to a car. That's why it's crucial to think about how you spend on food, and most importantly: to cook your own meals. Below are suggestions for dishes that provide delicious dinners, lunches, and especially packed lunches, while still being budget-friendly.

Bolognese Sauce

1 dinner + 2-3 packed lunches.

1 yellow onion

500 grams minced meat (mixed) 3 cloves garlic

1 can crushed tomatoes (Mutti if CSN allows) Salt and pepper

Here's how:

- 1. Chop the onion and sauté it in a bit of butter.
- 2. Add the minced meat and cook until it's almost fully cooked.
- 3. Pour in the crushed tomatoes and add pressed garlic.
- 4. Let the sauce simmer for 7-10 minutes and season with salt and pepper.

Serve the bolognese sauce with spaghetti or other pasta.

Chili sin Carne

1 dinner + 3-5 packed lunches depending on whether served with or without rice.

1 can white beans 1 can black beans 1 can crushed tomatoes 1 yellow onion 3 cloves garlic 2-3 tsp cumin 1-1.5 tbsp paprika powder optional cayenne pepper salt and pepper

Here's how:

- 1. Chop the onion and sauté it in a bit of butter.
- 2. Add the spices while stirring, making sure the mixture doesn't burn.
- 3. Pour in the crushed tomatoes and two types of beans, then reduce the heat. Add salt and pepper to taste and let the chili simmer for about 7-10 minutes. Stir occasionally to avoid burning the chili.

Serve chili sin carne with rice or as is.

Potato and Leek Soup

1 dinner + 2-3 packed lunches.

600 grams potatoes

- 1 leek 1 liter vegetable broth (water + broth cube) 3 dl cooking cream
- salt and pepper

Here's how:

- 1. Wash and chop the leek, then sauté it in a bit of butter in a large pot.
- 2. Peel and dice the potatoes into smaller pieces (about 2x2 cm). Add the potatoes and broth to the pot and let it boil for about 15 minutes.
- 3. Blend the soup until smooth using an immersion blender or regular blender.
- 4. Add the cream and let the soup simmer over medium-high heat for a couple of minutes.
- 5. Season with salt and pepper.

Spring Rolls with Noodles

1 dinner.

1 package instant noodles (preferably Samyang) 1-2 spring onions Sriracha mayo Meat or chicken 3 sheets rice paper optional cheese

Here's how:

- 1. Cook the noodles according to the package instructions. The less liquid remaining when the noodles are done, the better.
- 2. Brush one rice paper at a time with water or quickly run it under the tap. Place the paper on a plate and fill it with noodles, cooked chicken or other meat (perfect for using leftovers from the previous dinner), sliced spring onions, and Sriracha mayo. It's also good to add a slice of cheese.
- 3. Roll up the rice paper by folding in the sides and rolling the contents toward you. Try to tighten the roll to prevent the contents from falling out.

PS. If you don't have meat or chicken available, it works just as well without.

Homemade Bread

A project that takes a bit more time but can save money. Make a couple of loaves at once if possible.

2 loaves.

25 g yeast for bread 5 dl water 1 dl milk 2 tbsp honey 2-2.5 tsp salt 13 dl wheat flour 1 egg for brushing

Here's how:

- 1. Warm the water and milk to room temperature. Crumble the yeast into a bowl and pour the warm liquid over it. Mix until the yeast has dissolved.
- Add honey, salt, and flour. Quickly work the ingredients into a dough without kneading for more than a couple of minutes.
- 3. Line two bread pans with parchment paper and shape the dough into two loaves. Place the dough in the pans and let them rise for 60 minutes.
- 4. Preheat the oven to 200 degrees Celsius (392 degrees Fahrenheit).
- 5. Brush the loaves with beaten egg and bake in the lower part of the oven for 30-35 minutes.
- 6. Allow the bread to cool before slicing.

PS. Bread pans can often be found at second-hand stores for around 20 SEK, but you can also bake the dough into rolls or more traditional loaves. If you want to make loaves without a pan: let the dough rise in the bowl and shape the dough shortly before placing it in the oven.

Potato Pancakes with Pork

1 dinner + 3 packed lunches

800 grams firm potatoes 2 dl wheat flour 4 dl milk 1 tsp salt 1 egg fried pork or bacon for serving lingonberry jam for serving

Here's how:

- Whisk a bit of the milk with flour and salt until the batter is no longer lumpy. Add the rest of the milk and the egg.
- 2. Peel and grate the potatoes coarsely, then stir them into the batter.
- 3. Fry the potato pancakes, about ½ dl of batter per pancake, in butter for a couple of minutes on each side.
- 4. Serve the potato pancakes with lingonberry jam and fried pork or bacon.

Tip - Rice Cooker

Probably the best thing in my kitchen. Rice is cheap and the foundation for endless dishes, and with a rice cooker, it turns out perfect every time. A cheap rice cooker costs between 300-400 SEK. WHY SHOULD I GET A MEMBERSHIP IN THE STUDENT UNION?

The student union is also a member of Stockholm Student Unions (SSCO), where, along with other student unions in Stockholm, we work towards more student housing, improved student finances, and enhanced student well-being. Through SSCO, you also gain access to SSSB's student housing.

We are represented in all the university's preparatory and decision-making bodies, all to ensure that you have as much influence as possible over your study period! As a member, you can get involved in the student union's educational advocacy organization, the Civil Section, and represent your fellow students in various university bodies. Engaging as a student representative is both a merit for your future professional life and an invaluable opportunity to influence your education!

The Civil Section also helps you keep track of your rights and supports you if you are mistreated during your education.

The student union's labor market group, Kompass, organizes lectures and industry visits together with potential employers and decision-makers in defense, crisis management, and security. In the past year, students have met with figures such as Foreign Minister Tobias Billström, former prime minister Magdalena Andersson, and CEO of Sveriges Radio Cilla Benkö in the Sverigesalen, and our members have had the chance to visit a French naval ship during its visit to Stockholm. Kompass also organizes the student union's job fair. Take the opportunity to engage to strengthen your position in the job market!

The study social Committee organizes gatherings, events in the mess hall, and of course, the introduction week! As a member of the study social Committee, you have the opportunity to contribute to the planning of our future gatherings and the reception of our new students. Those who work at a gathering also get to attend the following one for free as a thank-you for their involvement! Members of the student union also gain access to several benefits, including the Mecenat card with favorable student discounts and the opportunity to join SSSB's housing queue!


As a member of the student union, you will receive, among other things:
